

Zackery Maule's Story

hen Zackery Maule was chosen to represent Plano's Vines High School as a High School Hero for Junior Achievement, his mother Annette was beaming with pride. She knew it would be an investment of his time, but Annette - a mentor, a dedicated volunteer for her two children's schools, a past President of Plano ISD Council of PTAs and an active community volunteer - knew the impact that volunteering makes, especially in schools. What she didn't expect was that this experience would help her son set his future goals and inspire her to get involved as well.

"When Zack would get into the car after his days at his JA school, Meadows Elementary, he was just beaming and more excited than I have ever seen him," said Annette. "He talked non-stop about the kids, their questions and what they were learning."

Zack's enthusiasm was contagious: The kids loved learning from him. "One day he had an epiphany, he climbed into the car and told me he wanted to be a teacher and help make learning exciting and easier," said Annette.



Zackery has struggled in school because he is dyslexic. According to Annette he has pushed his way through, but it has been a roller coaster ride as his confidence sometimes gets knocked down along the way. Through JA's High School Hero program, he realized that he had learning experiences that could help others find their path. "This program has given Zackery inspiration and confidence for his own life like no other experience in high school has," added Annette.

And Zackery, without realizing it, inspired his mother too. When a good friend of Annette's subtly sent her information about volunteering for JA's program at Haggard Middle School, Annette was elated. She now had a chance to give back to a program that not only inspires the students it touches, but the mentors as well.

"When I am in the classroom with the kids, I am so energized because they are completely involved and asking questions," said Annette. "This program exposes them to so much and helps them realize new things that are out there – it is incredible and I wish every student would have the opportunity to experience it."

STANDARD JA CURRICULUM

is a real-life simulation where more than 4,000 middle and high school students experienced making intelligent lifelong personal finance decisions. With the all-new digitized format, these students had even more one-on-one time with their volunteer to help make those tough life decisions and ask questions to better understand the real world, setting a budget and managing it in 20 separate areas.

JA JOB SHADOW™

offers high school students a unique opportunity: a visit to a professional work environment where they receive insights into how to identify and develop a fulfilling career. This year over 900 students from 16 high schools had the privilege of visiting Accenture, AT&T, Microsoft or Thomson Reuters to acquire and apply the skills needed in demanding and ever-changing workplaces and learn about a variety of careers and their requirements. They also developed job-hunting tools such as networking, resumes, and interviewing skills.

JA HIGH SCHOOL HEROES

saw an increase in participation from local high schools. Over 600 high school students from 13 schools delivered the JA Curriculum. Seeing the value of being role models to the younger students, they exemplified the importance of staying in school, while developing and strengthening leadership, communication, presentation and team-building skills. Nearly 5,500 elementary students got to imagine their own futures as successful high school students while learning the entrepreneurship, financial literacy and work readiness concepts contained in JA's programs.

JA volunteers partner with high school business classes to provide the students with a 13-week experience of starting a company, selling a product and learning what it takes to be an entrepreneur today.




